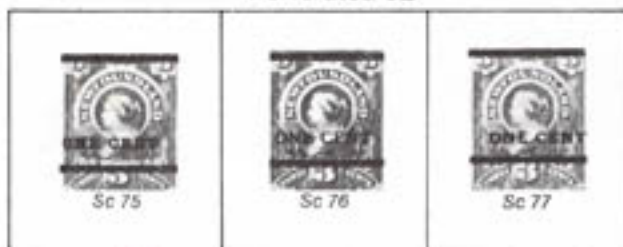

Map of Newfoundland

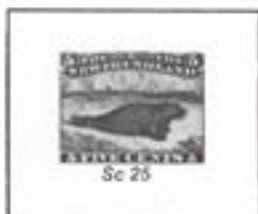

SILVER JUBILEE CABOT ISSUE 1897

Newfoundland had a double celebration in 1897, for, in addition to Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, it was also the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the island by John Cabot.

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When these stamps were issued, a notice was sent out by the General Post Office, St. John's, stating: "The only stamps on sale at the Postal Department are those issued to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of the Island of Newfoundland by John Cabot." There are 14 varieties. All previous issues of Stamps, Newspaper Wrappers and Stamped Envelopes are withdrawn from sale . . ."

NEWFOUNDLAND

The first attempt at a permanent settlement in Newfoundland took place in 1610 when John Guy of Bristol brought 41 people to found a colony at Cupids on Conception Bay. The fish merchants of England, who controlled the fishing industry were unfriendly to settlers and exerted political pressure to get harsh laws passed forbidding people to settle on the island. In spite of the regulations, the colony survived for eighteen years. In 1910, elaborate celebrations were held to commemorate Guy's valiant attempt.

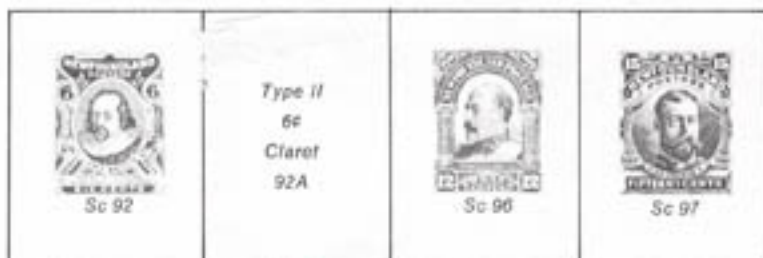

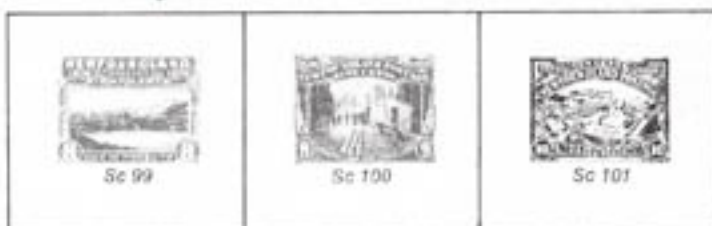

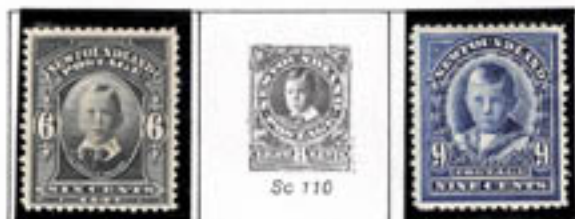

TRAIL OF THE CARIBOU ISSUE 1919

The Trail of the Caribou Issue commemorates the services of the Newfoundland Contingent in World War I. Four of the stamps honoring the Naval Forces are inscribed "Ubique," Latin for 'everywhere.' The other eight stamps are inscribed with the name of an engagement in which the Newfoundland Forces participated.

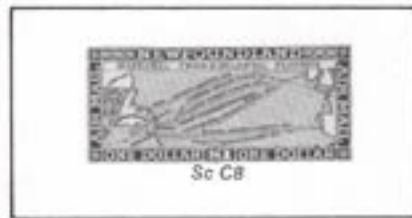

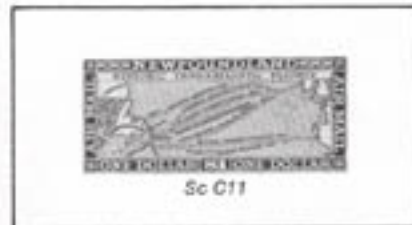


In anticipation of a regular trans-Atlantic airmail service, definitive airmail stamps were produced.

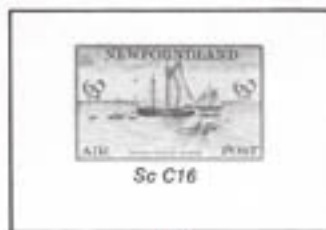
