



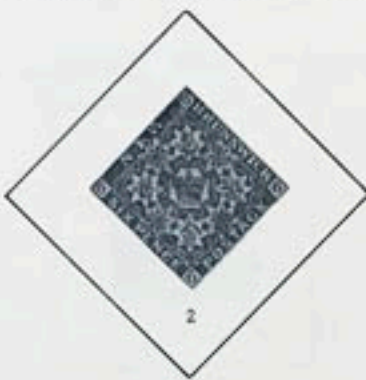
NEW BRUNSWICK

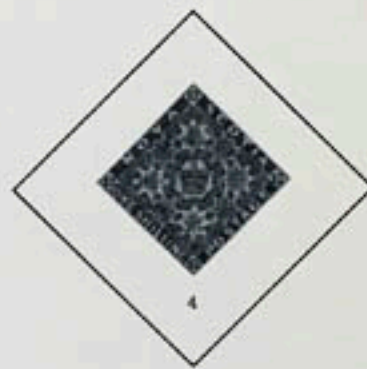
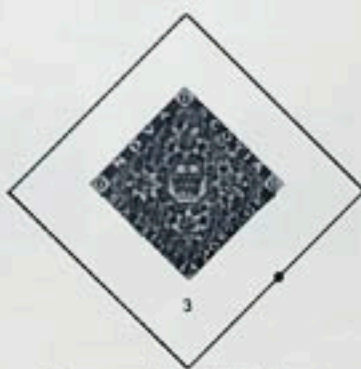
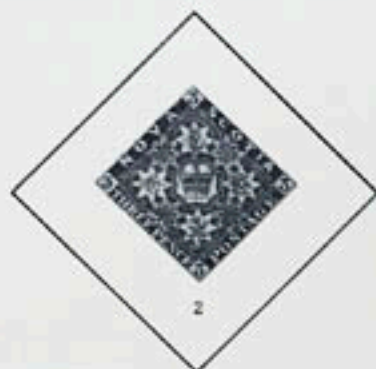
NOVA SCOTIA

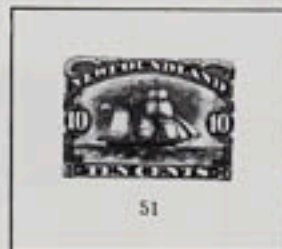

1c King James I (1566-1625): Granted charter of colonization of Newfoundland.
2c Arms granted to the colony in 1637 by King Charles I and adopted by
government of Newfoundland in 1928. 3c John Guy, mayor of Bristol, England,
who obtained the land grant and settled at Cupids with about 40 colonists.



4c John Guy's flagship "The Endeavor." 5c View of Cupids
on Conception Bay, the site of Guy's Colony. Colony ceased
to exist in 1628.



6c Francis Bacon, Lord Chancellor to James I, was instrumental in securing the
charter for Guy's company. He was a stockholder in the company. 12c Edward
VII (died in 1910). 15c King George V.



8c View of Mosquito, a branch of the Cupid's Colony, also founded by John Guy.
9c Logging camp on Red Indian Lake. 10c Paper Mills at Grand Falls.

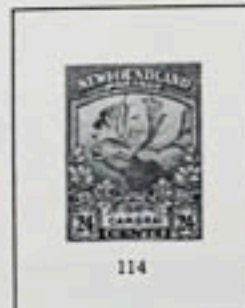

2c: SS Caribou, operating between Port-aux-Basques and North Sidney, Nova Scotia. 3c: Queen Mary and George V. 5c: Express train between St. John's and Port-aux-Basques (547 miles).



1c: New Boundaries of Newfoundland. 4c: Prince of Wales (Edward VIII). 9c, 14c: Cabot Tower, St. John's, built in 1897 on Signal Hill, site of Amherst's victory over French, first transatlantic telephone message received in 1858 and first radio message in 1901, both at this site.



12c, 28c: General Post Office at St. John's. 30c: Grand Falls on Hamilton River, Labrador. Falls have a drop of 300 feet.



6c: Newfoundland Hotel, St. John's. 8c: Heart's Content, relay station for transatlantic cables from England.

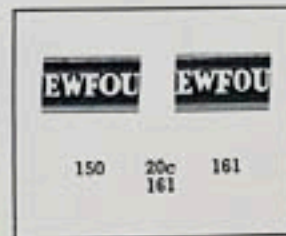

1933 350TH ANNIV. ANNEXATION



1c: Sir Humphrey Gilbert. 2c: Compton Castle, Devon, England, home of the Gilbert family. 3c: Gilbert family crest (showing squirrel after which one of his ships was named) motto: Quid non (Why not). 4c: Eton College from which Gilbert graduated before going to Oxford to complete his education.



7c: Sir Humphrey receiving Royal Colonization Patents on June 11, 1578. 8c: Gilbert's ships, Delight, Golden Hind, Swallow, Squirrel, led by the flagship Raleigh leaving Plymouth Harbor in 1683. The Raleigh turned back before the fleet reached the open sea. 9c: The four vessels passing through the narrows at St. John's on August 3, 1583.



5c: Token sent by Queen Elizabeth on the eve of Sir Humphrey Gilbert's departure. 14c: Arms of England with quotation from Sir Humphrey's report on annexation. 15c: The Squirrel in a storm off Azores: Sir Humphrey crying out to the Golden Hind, "We are as near to heaven by sea as by land." He perished with his ship a few hours later on September 9, 1583. 24c: Queen Elizabeth I.

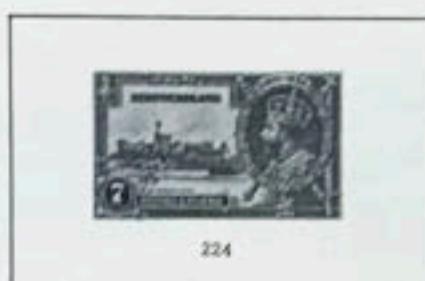

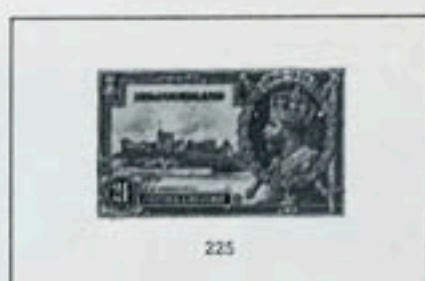

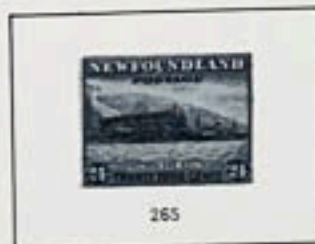
