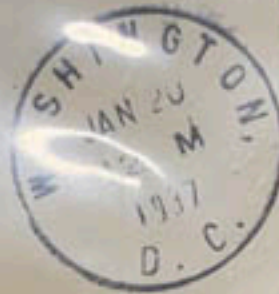

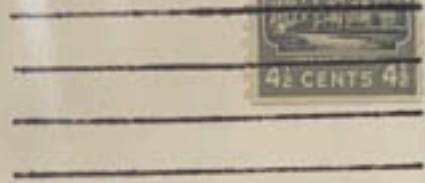

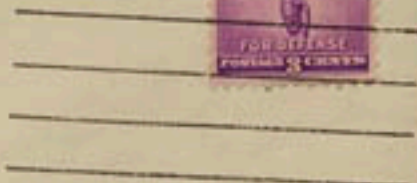

died in his mid-thirties; and Andrew, born shortly before Eliza became a consumptive invalid, and who was thirteen when the family moved into the White House.

During the first months of the Civil War, Eliza felt safe in Greeneville, strongly pro-Union, but in 1862 General Kirby Smith overran the village with a Confederate force. He forced her to gather her children and grandchildren together and travel as best she could through the Confederate lines to Nashville, where her husband was military governor of Tennessee for the Federal government. On Johnson's assumption of the Presidency, April 15, 1865, members of his family were immediately informed that they need not hasten to Washington as it would be several weeks before Mrs. Lincoln would be well enough to

leave the White House. It was June when the Johnsons arrived, quietly but in large numbers, there being four children and five grandchildren, plus a son-in-law.

By this time Mrs. Johnson was a confirmed invalid, but a cheerful and alert one. While her daughters took over the social duties, Eliza, having selected her bedroom exactly across the hall from Andy's study, continued to be his confidante and, as always, the great mollifier of the Johnson temper. When his term of office was done, she returned to Greeneville to enjoy the refurbishing and enlargement of the brick house, living there for several serene years, outliving Andy by nearly six months, and finally dying there January 15, 1876.
