The first issue of Canal Zone postage stamps was prepared by overprinting stamps of Panama with "Canal Zone", using a hand-stamp. These same stamps had previously been overprinted "PANAMA" on stamps of Colombia, so that each stamp actually shows two overprintings.

The stamps of the second series are overprinted on United States stamps of the regular issue of 1902-1903 with the exception of the Washington 2-cent shield of 1903. They were placed on sale July 15, 1904 and removed from sale December 11, 1904.

This group consisted of Colombia stamps with overprint of "PANAMA" and Bar in red, as well as an additional overprint of "CANAL ZONE" in black. There are several varieties to be found in the type faces used in the overprints.

In addition to the overprinting as mentioned for the above stamp, these stamps also bear an "8 cts" surcharge over the 50 centavos. The stamp on the right differs from the one on the left in that the surcharge "PANAMA" reads up on both sides of the stamp.

The Canal construction workers proved such good customers for the Canal Zone post offices that the administration had difficulty keeping supplies of stamps on hand. Shortages were frequent and to meet this shortage in April, 1906, Panama furnished the Canal Zone with a supply of stamps of the 1892-1896 map series. These were of the 20-centavo and 1-peso values, and were delivered without overprints. The overprinting was done in black, all in one operation at the Isthmian Canal Commission's printing plant.

This is Panama's first portrait series and was engraved and printed by the Hamilton Bank Note Company of New York. The ornate frames and colors of each value differ but the portraits in the centers of all are black. The denominations now read in "Balboas" and "centesimos" replacing "pesos" and "centavos," an effect of the changeover from a silver to a gold standard. The stamps were released between October, 1906 and January, 1907. A number of overprinting errors exist.

Released between January 1909 and May, 1909, this series continues the portraits in the last series, but the ornamental frame designs have been changed. The order for these stamps was placed with the American Bank Note Company, New York by the Panama Government.

The basic stamps of this series are the same as those described in the previous series. The one exception is the 1-cent Balboa which has been added. This series was in use between 1909 and 1924. For the first time, the overprinting of "CANAL ZONE" was done by the makers of the stamps rather than the Isthmian Canal Commission's printing plant.

In 1914, by Presidential decree, Panama issued a set of stamps marking the opening of the Panama National Exposition which was to take place in 1915. The Canal cooperated by having these stamps overprinted for use in the Canal Zone. Prepared by the American Bank Note Company, they are noted for their historical engravings and beauty of color and design.

About a year later the need arose for higher denomination stamps in the Zone and the Director of Posts requested Panama stamps in the denominations of 12c, 15c, and 24c. Official Panama Canal pictures were furnished Panama as subjects for the stamps. The stamps went on sale in all Canal Zone post offices January 1917.

Fifty-cent and dollar denomination stamps were requested of the Panama Government on November 29, 1919, and again official photographs were furnished which were relayed to the American Bank Note Company. They were received, overprinted, and put on sale by the Canal Zone on September 4, 1920.

Like all her Latin American neighbors, Panama, in 1921, celebrated the centenary of her independence from Spain

by issuing a set of postal stamps. Here, again, the Canal Zone postal service joined in the celebration by overprinting these stamps for use in the CANAL ZONE. The overprinting was by the American Bank Note Company.

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POSTAGE DUE STAMPS

1914



Prior to 1914 there were no postage due stamps in either the Panama or Canal Zone's postal systems. Postmasters or postal clerks merely ascertained the amount due, affixed ordinary stamps when the mail was claimed and paid for, cancelled the stamps and delivered the letter. This first issue was overprinted on United States postage dues of the 1910-1912 issue.

Although Panama had no postage due stamps to this date, the use of United States Postage Due stamps overprinted "CANAL ZONE" was the cause of an exchange of letters between Canal Zone and Panama authorities. Panama claimed a contravention of the Tatt Agreement. This new series of postage due stamps was the result.

A recommendation to Congress was made by President Warren G. Harding in September 1922, that the Taft Convention be abrogated; the date set was June 1, 1924, and President Calvin Coolidge subsequently issued an executive order proclaiming its effect as of that date. Once more, stamps of the United States were called into service and overprinted. The flat plate perforation 11 stamps of the 1922 regular issue series were used as shown above. Overprinting was in red or black with letters "A" in Canal Zone bearing flat tops.
